Student Assessment Report


The *Student Assessment Report* displays data for each administration of InSight. Use this report to view a student's baseline skill and motivation levels, and to analyze individual student growth over time. Compare a student's proficiency level, comprehension level, vocabulary level, reading rate, and motivation between each benchmark.

Identify the student's diagnostic profile, based on quadrant placement:

- Red Quadrant: Student is an inefficient, relatively slow reader who struggles with below-grade content.
- Orange Quadrant: Student appears able to read at a grade-appropriate rate, but only when reading below-grade content.
- Yellow Quadrant: Student can comprehend content at or above grade level, but is a relatively slow reader who lacks efficiency/fluency.
- Green Quadrant: Student is a proficient and efficient reader, and could benefit from Reading Plus as enrichment.

B1, **B2**, and/or **B3** icons indicate readiness for the Reading component.

- Ready: Student is ready for the Reading component.
- Borderline: Student will be placed on lowest-level content in the Reading component.
- Not Ready: Student did not demonstrate mastery of 1st-grade level content. Ensure student has foundational reading skills before beginning work in the Reading component.

Benchmark 1 (Initial Assessment) provides data that is used to craft a student's personalized learning path. View the student's comprehension-based silent reading Rate in words per minute, along with the associated Percentile Rank. Percentile rank enables you to compare the student's rate to same-grade students across the United States.

Note the student's Comprehension Level and Vocabulary Level at each point of assessment.

Proficiency Level is a composite measure of comprehension, vocabulary, and silent reading rate.



View a written summary of the student's assessment results, including relevant instructional recommendations.

Consider the impact of Reading Plus use on student growth. Note the following:

- Number of Reading lessons completed at the time of each assessment. *The goal for most students is 100 lessons by the end of the school year.*
- Hours spent in the Reading component at the time of each assessment.
- Hours spent in all instructional components combined (Reading, Vocabulary, Visual Skills) at the time of each assessment.
